Book cover design is like packaging design for a story. Rather than summarizing the book, the design principles and visual cues should communicate:

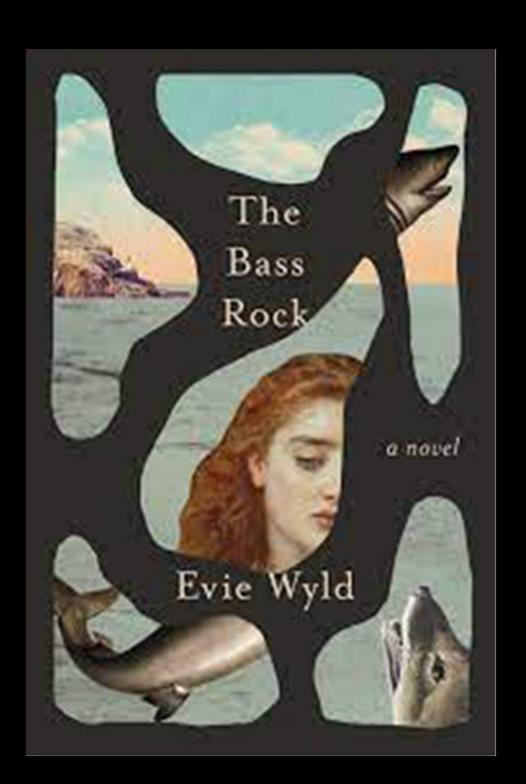
- 1. Author's writing style
- 2. Subject matter

- 4. Tone
- 5. Set the mood

1. Collage

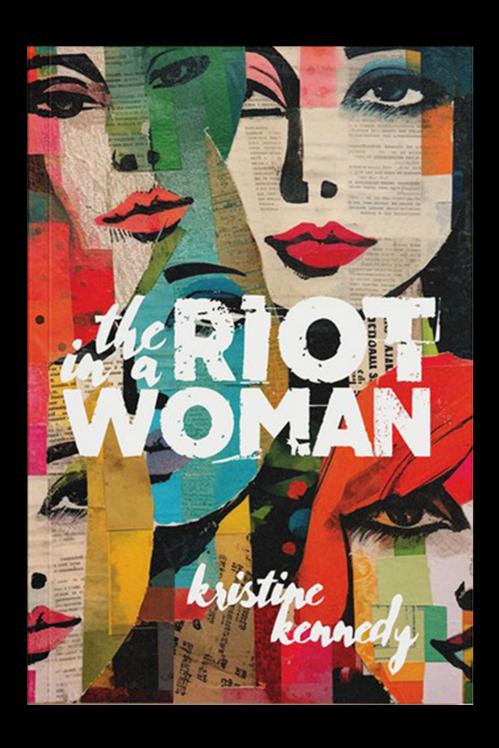
Bring together images from different perspectives to create a new perspective.

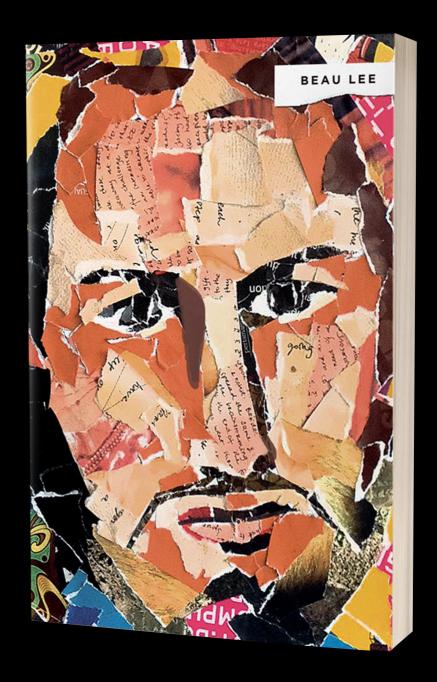


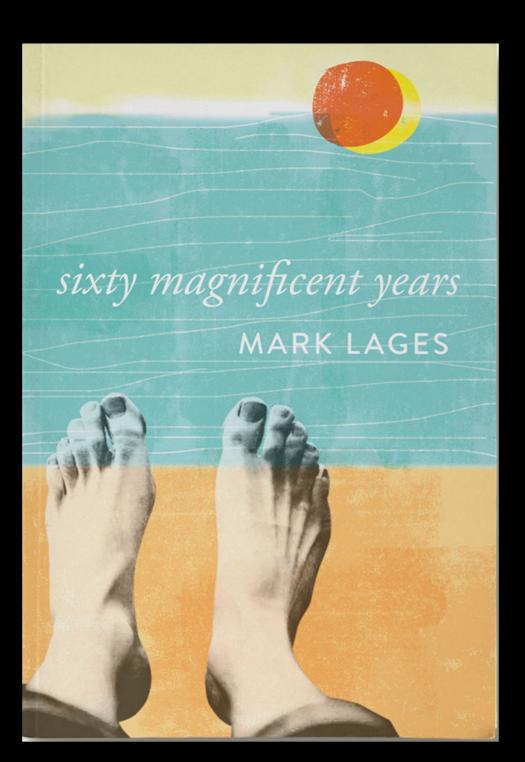

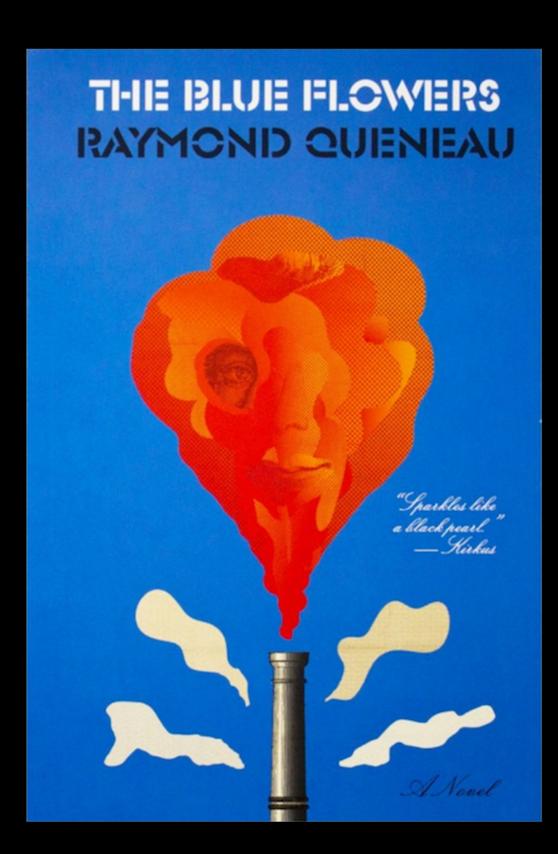


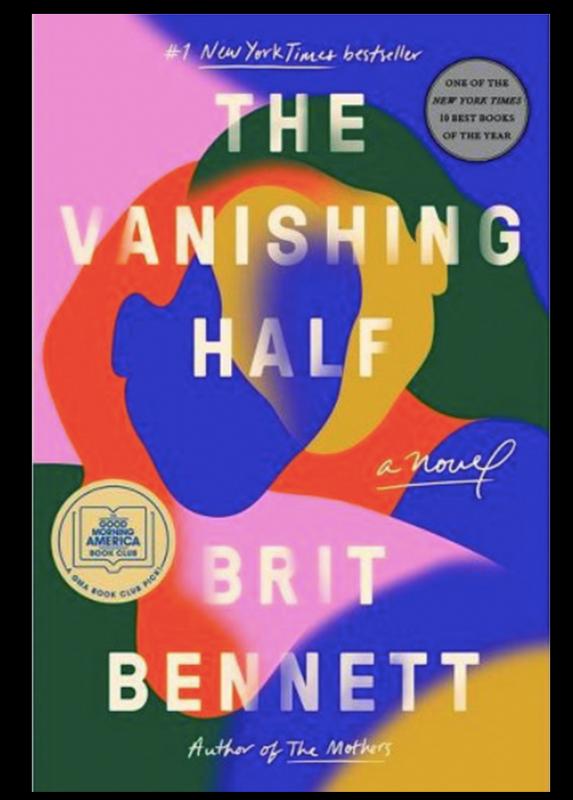




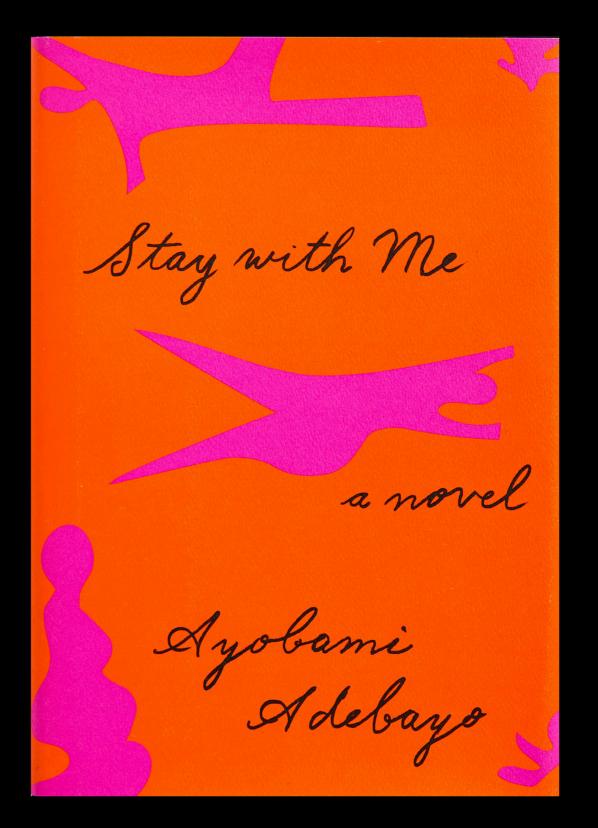
2. Abstract

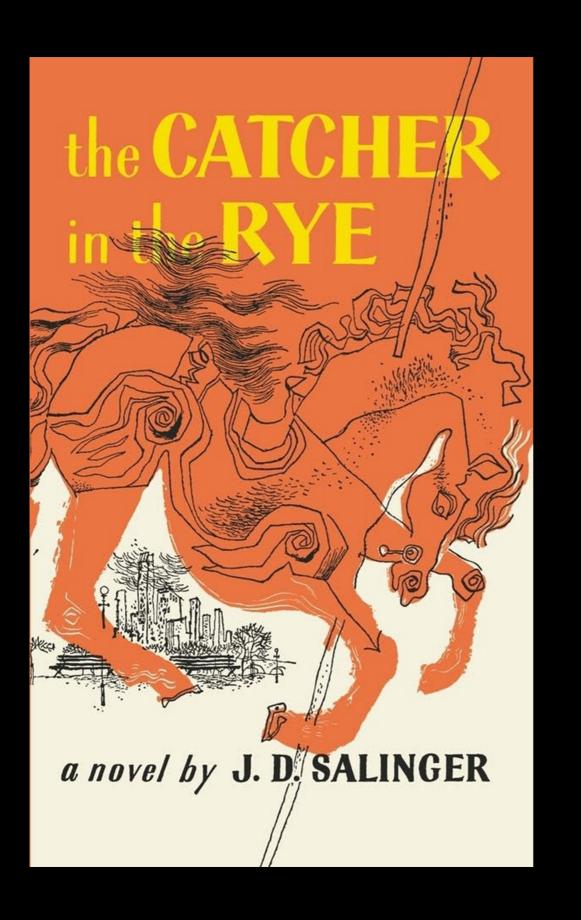
Use form, color, and pattern to describe mood. Make it static, disjointed, unified or create movement.

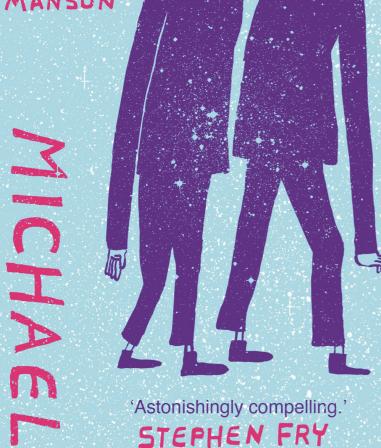
Consider line quality, line weight, definition (either realistic or sketchy), vector-based, 3D, painterly, cross-hatched, children's book style with textures

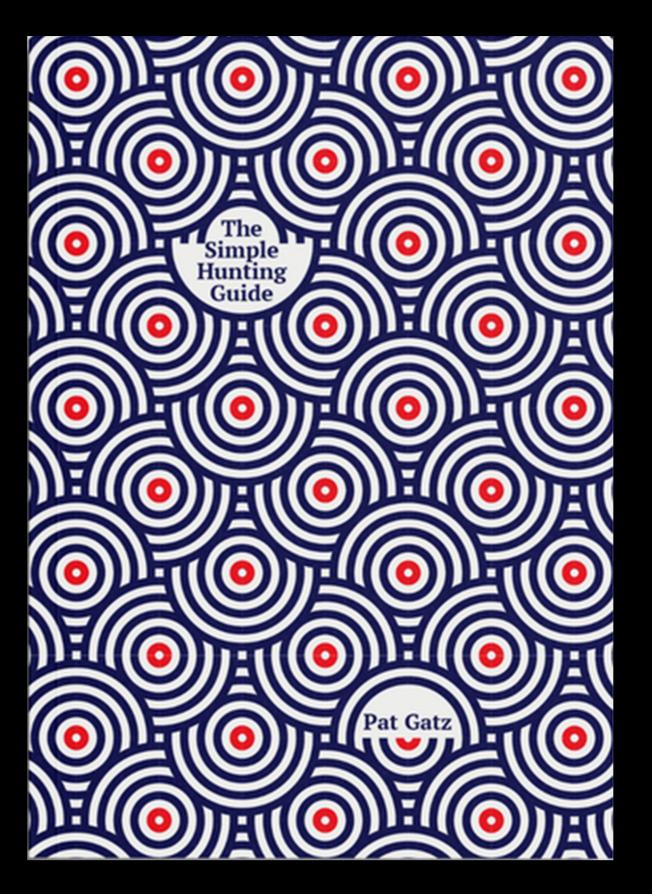
Use pattern to create rhyme, repetition, rhythm and movement.

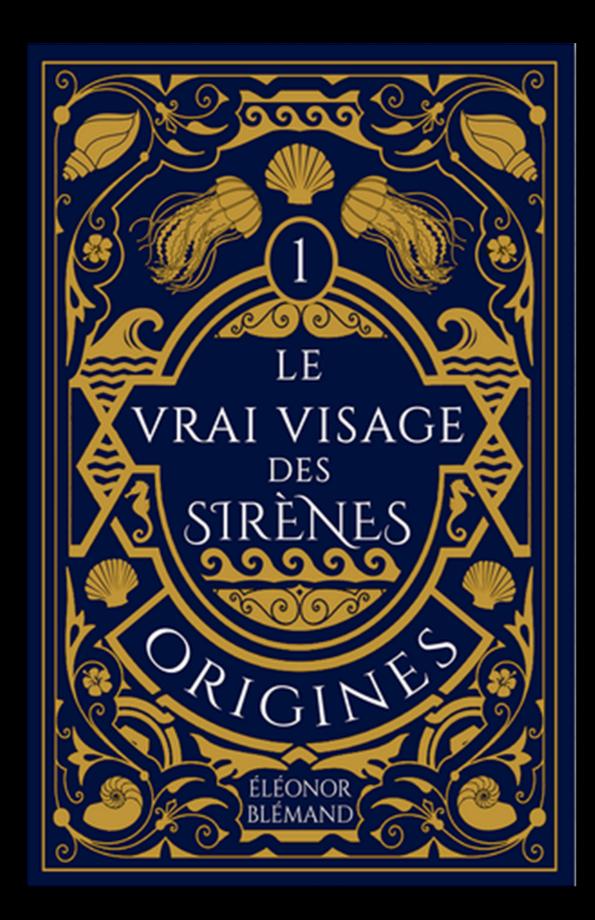


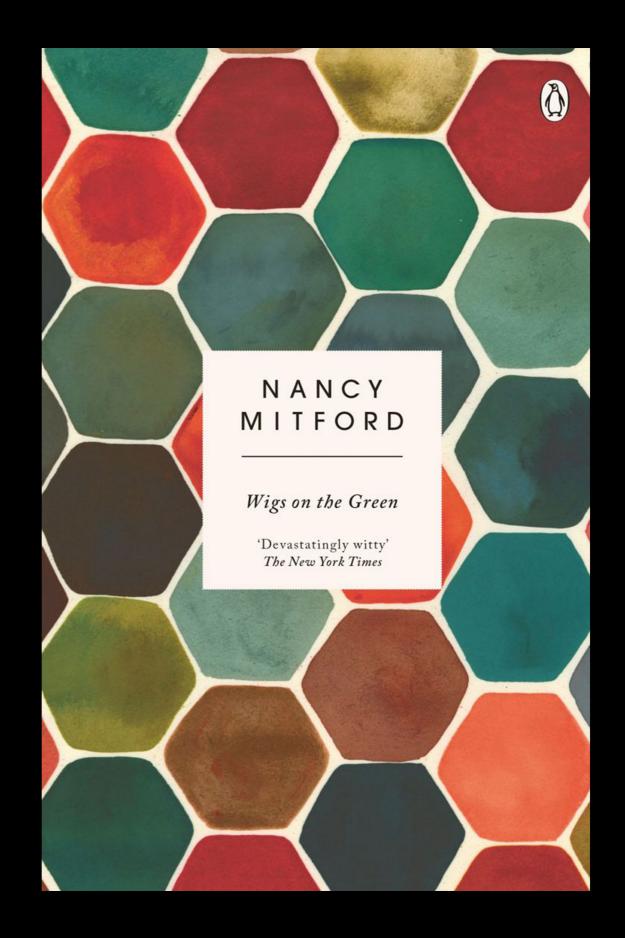








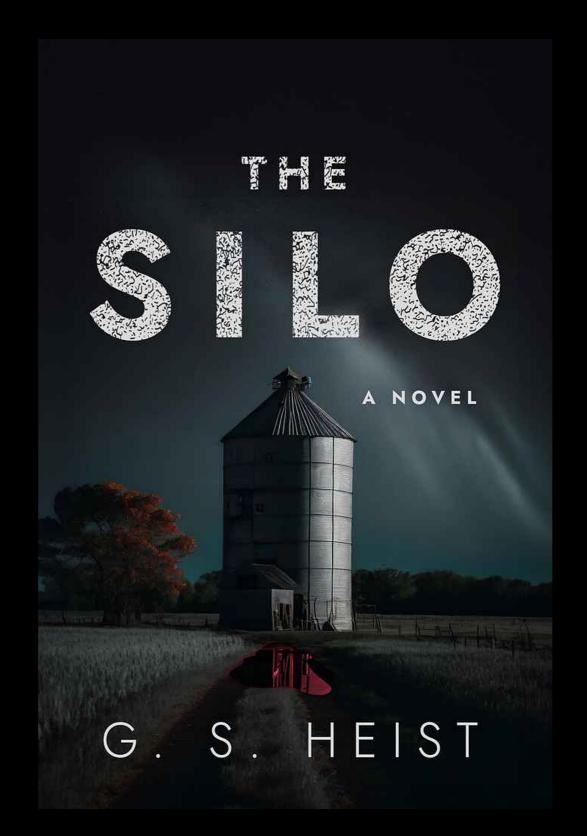


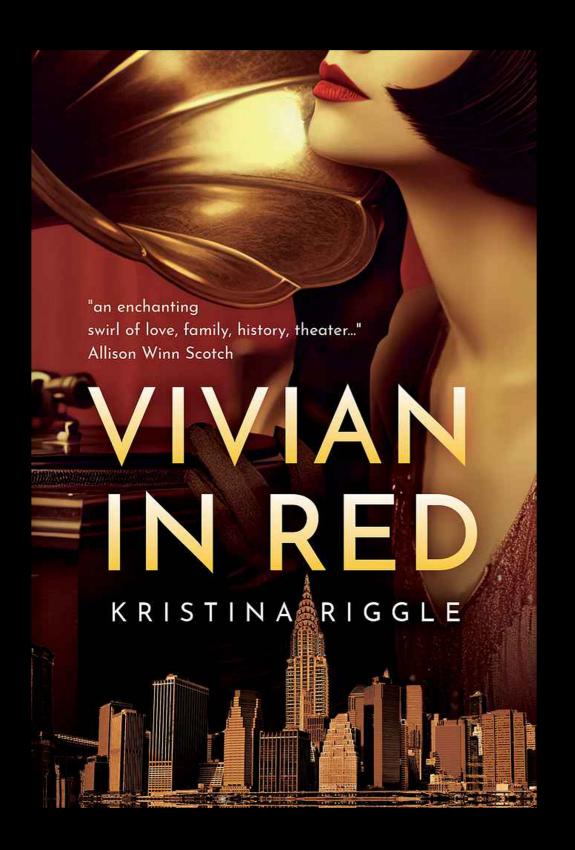


8. Photographic

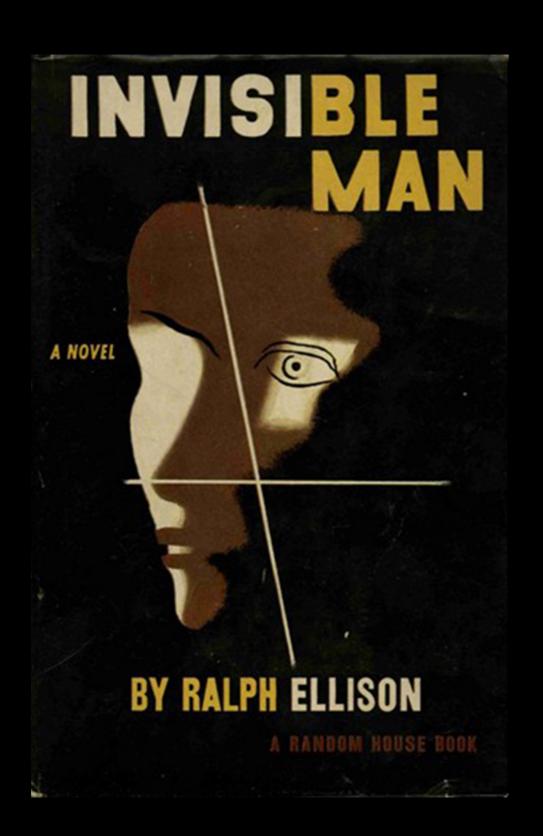

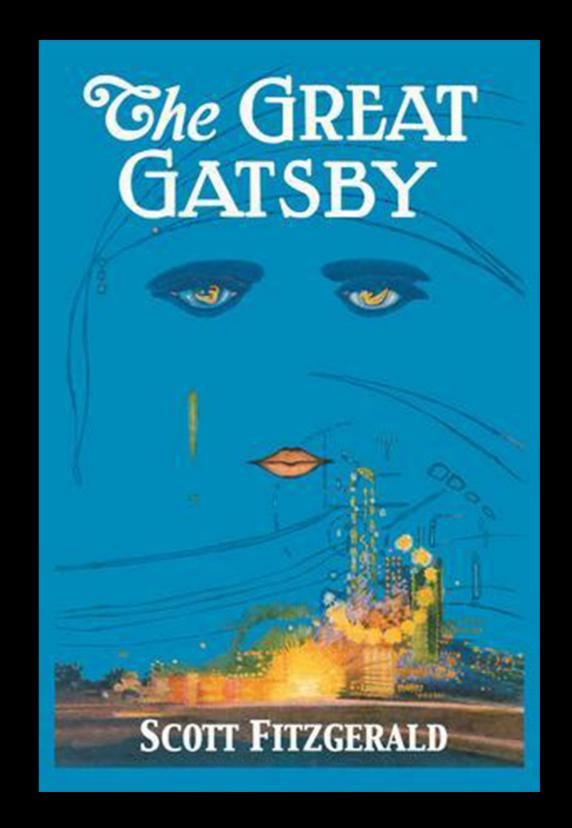

Use vintage visual cues to create a sense of nostalgia.

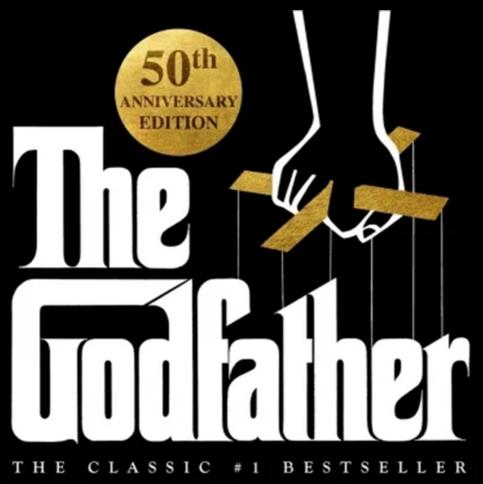

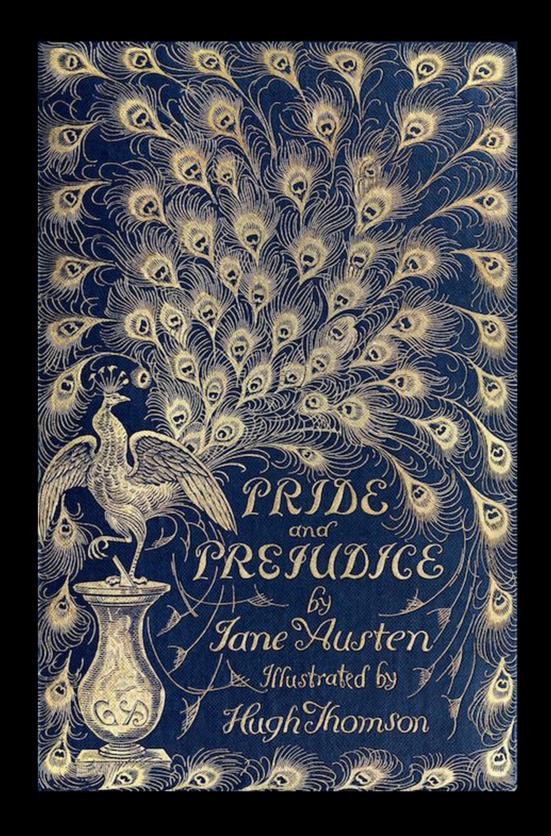

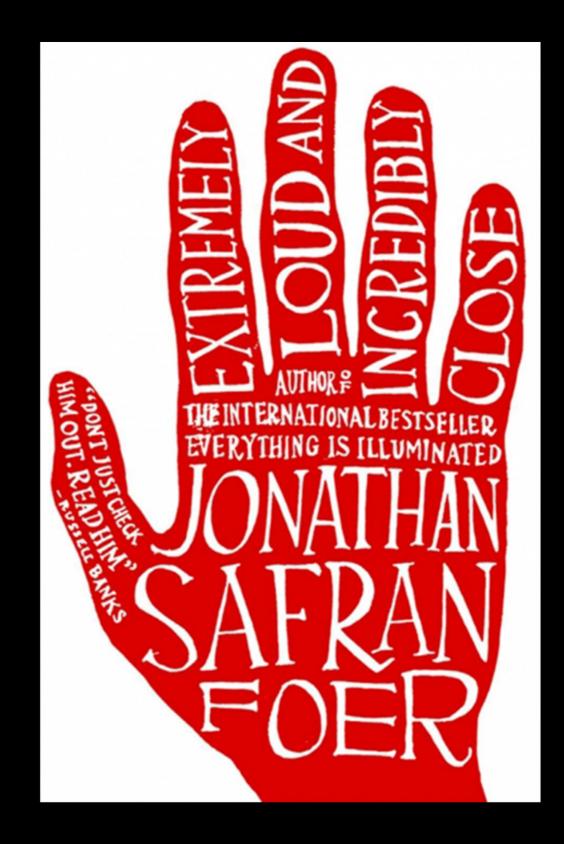
